PRESIDENT'S REPORT

ANDREW PEARCE • PRESIDENT

It is heartening to reflect on the past twelve months and observe the Club continuing to run more smoothly with each season. Patrols are well staffed and lifesavers well trained. Our lifesaving gear and equipment is in excellent order and well cared for. The education team has delivered a remarkable number of new awards and maintained our high standards. The building and facilities are in excellent repair, the boatshed renovation is outstanding. We successfully staged another spectacular Big Swim. Our finances are superbly managed. Our social scene continues to flourish as more people step forward to assist. The standard of our marketing is exceptional across all platforms, web, social media and print. At 467 the membership is the highest it's been in more than ten years. The calibre of the leadership team and patrol leadership continues to grow. Whale Beach SLSC again grew and flourished throughout the past year.

September

- The season opened with a Captains' Patrol.
- We won Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Rescue of the Month for the professionalism of our lifesavers when responding to a hang glider crash.
- Our education team ensured our lifesavers completed their annual proficiency tests.
- I attended the SLSA Leadership Masterclass on Strategic Thinking in Adelaide hosted by the University of South Australia.

October

- Knox Grammar School's Surf Life Saving program, under the leadership of Masters Nick Warby and David Stenning, grew to the largest it's been during our 20 year partnership.
- A Whale Beach SLSC contingent attended the Surf Life Saving Australia National Awards of Excellence where our December 2017 Rescue of the Year was recognised with a Meritorious Award.
- Boatshed renovations were completed, the transition to a standard befitting a professional rescue service is remarkable.

November

- \$25K grant was awarded by the NSW Government Community Building Partnership Program 2018 for replacement of boatshed roller doors.
- Belle Property Avalon, Fitness First Avalon and Whale Beach SLSC commenced co-hosting community yoga at 7am on the first Saturday of each month.

December

• We welcomed incoming Club Administrator Sarah Warburton and farewelled outgoing Club Administrator Sue Kearney. We wish Sue all the best and thank her for all her efforts.

 The Christmas volunteer patrol was well attended and the traditional pudding race was held. In the evening conditions deteriorated. Our patrollers performed countless board rescues until well after 7pm. A truly heroic effort.

January

- \$37K grant was awarded by the NSW Office of Sport Surf Club Facility Grant Program 2018 for solar installation, video surveillance system upgrade and replacement of the outdoor clock.
- For the first time in living memory Neighbours Night was thwarted by wild weather. Despite this, a wonderful evening of great food, music and socialising was enjoyed by those whose spirits could not be dampened.
- Our major fundraiser, The Big Swim, went off without a hitch. Race Director Annette Baggie did exceptionally well in her first year.

February

- Knox and Whale Beach SLSC hosted a spectacular schools carnival with teams from five schools attending. Knox was victorious, the first time in five years.
- \$10K grant was awarded by the Federal Government Stronger Communities Programme for a replacement patrol gear trailer.

March / April

- After a number of false starts due to unfavourable surf conditions, the Club Championships were finally held on Easter Monday with a small but enthusiastic crowd participating.
- \$10K contribution was received from Northern Beaches Council towards the cost of installing new boatshed roller doors.
- The season closed with a Captains' Patrol. It was pleasing that, again, we did not breach our Lifesaving Service Agreement.

May

 No rest for the weary, we commenced the organisation for our annual Awards Night and the production of the annual report.

June

- Our fabulous tenants, Moby Dicks, hosted our annual Awards Night themed 'glitz and glamour'.
- Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Awards of Excellence dinner where we had nominations submitted for Volunteer of the Year, Trainer of the Year, Young Lifesaver of the Year and Services Team of the Year.

July / August

- At the Club's Annual General Meeting, the annual report and financial reports are presented and next season's officers elected.
 We celebrate the launch of the 2019-20 lifesaving season.
- The Gear Committee service all the lifesaving equipment to be presented for annual inspection and certification.
- Winners at the Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Awards of Excellence progress to be nominated at the annual Surf Life Saving NSW Awards of Excellence which we attend.

Our strategic plan for the future is built on these six objectives:

Membership: To increase membership through engagement and retention. The goal is half day patrols all season.

Community: To foster an all-inclusive organisation that protects, educates, prepares and embraces everyone.

Profile: To position Whale Beach SLSC as a professional volunteer emergency service.

Work Together: To engage with all levels of the organisation and develop our leaders to drive the Club now and in the future.

Strengthen: To ensure the continuity of a financially sustainable and resilient organisation and to utilise technology to drive efficiencies.

Capability: To ensure our lifesavers are skilled, trained, resourced and ready to respond to the needs of our community.

In the 2019-20 season the focus will be on our people. We will continue to recruit and train new lifesavers with the aim of increasing the number of patrol teams and moving to half day patrols all season. We will launch a leadership development program to provide a pathway from Surf Rescue Certificate through to President providing our members with exceptional opportunities to grow. We will launch a Member Protection program to ensure that the well-being of all our members is protected. We will roll out the communication platform Team App, this technology will improve the experience for our lifesavers and leaders.

TREASURER'S REPORT

JON PRATTEN • HONORARY TREASURER

STATEMENT BY MEMBERS OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

This year has again been financially satisfactory with revenue and expenditure both increasing. We had a net profit of \$2K after a donation from our Property Club of \$15K. External income was \$255K, with the main contributions coming from The Big Swim (\$108K), members' subscriptions (\$50K), surf club functions (\$43K), donations other than the Property Club (\$20K) and sponsorship and grants (\$24K). Expenses were \$269K. Major expenses were The Big Swim (\$49K), repairs and maintenance (\$46K), administration (\$36K) and surf club functions (\$34K).

The Big Swim continues to be a most important contributor to our financial well-being. Our thanks again go to our major sponsor for The Big Swim, Macquarie Group. Macquarie Group have sponsored The Big Swim for 21 years, and have again agreed to renew their sponsorship. Thanks go also to our major sponsor for the Little Big Swim, United Resource Management, who also help us greatly by providing our rubbish removal service at no charge.

Donations and grants are lifeblood to the Club. Thank you so much again to all member, friend and private donors. It is easy to take for granted the key assistance we receive from government and non-government entities. This year we had a \$3K grant for our boatshed floor resurfacing from the Australian Government, a \$1K grant for a public defibrillator from the NSW Government, a \$5K grant from the Australian Government for beach safety equipment, an \$8K donation from Northern Beaches Council, a \$6K donation from Surf Life Saving NSW, and an \$10K grant from the Federal Government towards a new lifesaving equipment trailer. Australian Lifeguard Services provide us with the use of their All Terrain Vehicle at minimum cost to us.

Club functions made a small profit this year. We are again indebted to Andrew and Pip for the favourable terms offered by Moby Dicks. Mobys help out generously for our Neighbours Night, Awards Night and other regular Club gatherings.

This year we completed very worthwhile improvements to the boatshed, including resurfacing the floor and improving our lifesaving gear storage facilities. Further work is underway to replace the boatshed entry roller shutters. Since the end of the financial year we have installed 20kw of solar panels to the roof of the clubhouse, largely financed by a NSW Government grant. This should result in a significant reduction in our future energy costs.

We take a fairly heavy handed approach to depreciation (\$21K) of our surf lifesaving gear, as it does a tough job in a demanding environment. We want our patrols to be properly turned out with the best equipment available. The biggest contributors to our depreciation expense were surfboards, surf skis, IRBs, surfboats and oars.

Training costs remain high at \$19K, and you will observe the wonderful results we had for that from other correspondents in this report.

We completed the year with \$8K cash on hand.

Whale Beach SLSC Incorporated (the Club) is incorporated as an Association under the Associations Incorporation Act 1984 (NSW). The Club is required to meet certain obligations pursuant to the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Act 2012 (as amended) and Regulations, the Associations Incorporation Act 1984 (NSW) (as amended) and Regulations, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (as amended) and Regulations.

The financial statements included in this Annual Report are a summary extract from our full Financial Report, which may be found at https://www.whalebeachslsc.com/about/annual-reports/. Our full Financial Report includes our comprehensive compliance statements and the independent audit report from our Auditor, Reanda Business Intellect Pty Ltd.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

ALEXANDER BURCHETT • CLUB CAPTAIN

This season we witnessed the utmost tangibility of the skills we learn as surf lifesavers. 42 rescues, 22 first aid incidents, 190 preventative actions and 7,017 hours patrolled, performed by 183 proficient members, meant that zero lives were lost at one of Sydney's most untame beaches.

The season started in true Whaley form, with the rescue of a hang glider who suffered extensive fractures and abrasions after crashing into the headland. Teamwork and composure was demonstrated by the patrolling members, who helped emergency services extract the patient via helicopter. Whale Beach SLSC has continued to invest in the education and upskilling of its membership. The education team has gone above and beyond its responsibilities this season, running an exceptional number of Bronze Medallion, First Aid, ARTC and IRB courses. Due to this, the goal of half day patrols is no longer a mirage on the horizon, but a tangible reality for future seasons. The work of the

education team has facilitated the continued growth of lifesavers in number and skill. The unwavering effort of our Chief Training Officer Lara Boyle enabled four members to obtain their Gold Medallion. The education team is chiefly responsible for shaping the public view of Whale Beach lifesavers as not just volunteers, but professionals.

This season provided a window into the future leaders of the Club and saw the initiative of many new Patrol Captains developing their management skills. Patrol Captains demonstrated a high aptitude for managing the many, and occasionally severe, rescues that were put in front of them. The job is a highly demanding one, while also being the heart and soul of shaping the patrol as a team.

The Knox Grammar School Surf Life Saving program has continued to develop school students into valued members of the Club. David Stenning, Knox Head of Lifesaving and Patrol Captain, was able to coordinate the school sport with the Club's interests at heart. Thank you to the education team who worked closely with the Knox cohort

to nurture their growth as lifesavers. The end of season saw the rescue skills of Knox members enhanced by Nicholas Cooper. performing a board riding master class.

Moving into the 2019-20 season, we will continue to grow our membership, skills and culture. Further, the implementation of a centralised app to coordinate lifesaving at Whale Beach will help streamline communication between the membership. I hope the benchmarks of progress set by the last few seasons provides a momentum that empowers and supports younger members of the Club to undertake further roles and responsibilities. We will continue to nurture the talents of every member in the Club, providing avenues for growth and improvement.

A great deal of thanks is due to all the members who generously dedicate their time to help shape the Club into a fine example of professional lifesaving and community spirit. A special mention must be made to the Management Committee, the gear team, the education team, Club Vice Captains, Patrol Captains and every lifesaver, who are all essential to the Club's paramount duty of keeping the public in safe hands.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING REPORT

LARA BOYLE • CHIEF TRAINING OFFICER

What an incredible year for education. Our members improved their competence and confidence on the beach by gaining a total of 236 awards, attending over 30 courses, and over 150 members completing their skills maintenance. We saw a huge intake of 94 new surf lifesavers who will help protect the public on patrols while having fun and improving their skills.

We pioneered an innovative education internship program, developed highly regarded induction packs for patrollers, and had four new Golden Whales, with our Gold Medallion program circulated to every State Centre in Australia. I am so incredibly proud of every member who took the time to improve their competence and confidence in all areas of surf lifesaving. The public is truly 'In Safe Hands'.

Our skills maintenance sessions were some of the smoothest ever thanks to the help of our 24 highly competent delegates. Our Surf Rescue Certificate and Bronze Medallion courses were some of the largest in the last decade. A huge thanks goes to our dedicated training team for their tireless efforts, Chris Darley for gaining his Probationary Training Officer award, and our diverse range of new members for their commitment and unwavering enthusiasm.

Advanced lifesaving awards were off the charts this season. Four new Gold Medallions were earned by Eloise Riley (who smashed the field by hundreds of metres), Richard Leonard, Dylan Rees-Ewen, and Jack Lamrock, who stupendously gained both his Bronze and Gold Medallions in one season. We're hugely looking forward to our squad of 24 Golden Whales going for Gold early next season and we are always open to more participants.

Huge congratulations go to Hugo Clarke, Ethan Ravenhall, and Tom Constable for achieving their Silver Medallion Aquatic

Rescue (three of five members to have ever held it) where they lead searches, retrievals, rock jumping, and more. 22 current and future Patrol Captains gained the crucial Silver Medallion Beach Management award, ensuring we're maintaining best practice on patrols at all times.

Our phenomenal Inshore Rescue Boat (IRB) trainer Lindsay Kershaw put twelve members through their IRB Crew and four members through their IRB Drivers awards this season. A big thank you goes to the team at Warriewood SLSC for selflessly training one of our drivers on their course, we look forward to many more inter-club courses.

The education portfolio had a first of its kind internship program this year where three members gained the skills needed to become competent and confident Chief Training Officers. Thank you and congratulations to Sophie Wines, Ellie Love, and Ethan Ravenhall for helping us pioneer the way. This program has been circulated to clubs around NSW. We'll soon be recruiting for our next group of interns, so keep an eye out.

The whopping amount of new surf lifesavers this season wouldn't have been possible without the assistance of Sydney Northern Beaches Surf Life Saving School who trained all Knox members and hosted intensive courses for several new members. Also the Surf Life Saving NSW Academy helped 49 members achieve their First Aid and 34 members become qualified in Advanced Resuscitation Techniques. We're incredibly grateful these providers exist to help us meet incredibly high training demands.

The exceptional efforts of our members were recognised with strong representation on NSW and Australian leadership development programs. Our fearless Club Captain Alexander Burchett and Patrol Captain of the Year Suzy

We pioneered an innovative education internship program

Bownes were accepted onto the Surf Life Saving QLD leadership program, Sophie Wines was accepted onto the Surf Life Saving NSW Youth Opportunity Makers Workshop, and Will McDonagh was a finalist in the Surf Life Saving Sydney Northern Beaches Junior Lifesaver of the Year competition. Congratulations to all, we're incredibly lucky to have you as Whaley members and are so proud you're flying the Whaley flag in our wider community.

Looking to next season there will be a strong focus on IRB awards to enable the Club to grow. There will also be emphasis on the beach training, honing our competence and confidence through mock scenarios, rescues, and practice of being a Patrol Captain. We're leaping into the future with thanks to the Surf Life Saving NSW VET Funding Panel who have equipped every club with four stateof-the-art electronic QCPR manikins and iPads to feedback on our lifesaving efforts in real time. Surf Life Saving Australia is also reviewing the Surf Rescue Certificate and Bronze Medallion courses with major changes coming through in 2021 which will affect every surf lifesaver, one to keep an eye out for.

A huge thanks again to every member for improving your lifesaving skills this season, and a special shoutout to our absolutely incredible training team. We couldn't do it without you!

In 2019 conditions for The Big Swim were very good, a nice sunny day and no big surf to contend with. With a total of 1,277 entries, this year our numbers were down slightly. There is now a lot more competition out there than when we first started.

Our two major sponsors Macquarie Group (The Big Swim) and URM (The Little Big Swim) have again provided us with the necessary support required to run this iconic event, which started in 1974. The Big Swim is thought to be NSW's longest continuous running ocean swim. Competitors start at Palm Beach, head out around the headland through the Tasman sea then finish at Whale Beach. I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for all his hard work. I would also like to thank all my guiding lights who helped me along the way in the latter half of 2018.

It wouldn't be possible to put on an event like The Big Swim and The Little Big Swim without all our marvellous volunteers who support our major fundraising event. They work tirelessly in the water, on the beaches manning registrations, food and beverages, water and fruit supplies, radios, car parking at all three venues, transportation of gear and of course all the preparations and post event clean up at both Palm Beach and Whale Beach. PINK ZINC PATROL

With momentum behind us, we're expanding opportunities for our legendary ladies Until 1980 women were not allowed to be surf lifesavers, a concept that seems completely foreign to us now. 39 years after Whale Beach SLSC put through four of the first women in Australia to earn their Bronze Medallion, we held what could only be dreamt of at that time, an all-female 'Pink Zinc Patrol'.

South Narrabeen SLSC put out the call in March for surf lifesavers from other clubs to assist their small membership to meet their patrol requirements. Little did they expect to be flooded with a sea of pink and a few flamingos. Inspired by Point Lonsdale SLSC and Ocean Grove SLSC in Victoria who began Pink Zinc Patrols, we jumped at the opportunity to help another club patrol its beach and leapt into action to make the event happen in under three weeks to align with International Women's Day. The event was a huge success with 45 women of all ages from six clubs flooding South Narrabeen, leaving them inspired and empowered after patrolling side by side and participating in a range of activities.

We gathered together in the clubhouse as Surf Life Saving NSW Volunteer of the Year Cathy Cole spoke about how far we've truly come, from the first female surf lifesavers patrolling in the 1940s making their bathers out of curtains, to finally being able to hold the Bronze Medallion in 1980. Women have now risen to the highest

levels in the Surf Life Saving movement, as Surf Life Saving Australia's Chief Executive Officer, Presidents, Rescue Jet Ski Operators, and Gold Medallion holders.

The South Narrabeen nippers then joined us for a rip dye demonstration, turning the ocean fluorescent green as surfers carved their way down the effervescent waves, before inflatable flamingos were commandeered as the surf craft of choice. First Aid scenarios were a highlight with bizarre mechanisms of injuries allowing us to hone our patient care and treatment skills, while the food and goody bags went off like a treat. Although the pink cupcakes will be outsourced next year (baking is not my forte).

With momentum behind us, we're expanding opportunities for our legendary ladies to develop their skills by hosting a 'Girls Night In' where our women of Whale will come together to share stories, learn life skills, spend the night at the clubhouse, and of course come up with ideas to make next year's Pink Zinc Patrol even bigger and better.

Thank you to everyone who made the day so special. A huge thank you in particular goes to South Narrabeen SLSC Club Captain Sarah Oaten for letting us hold the event at their beach and being so actively engaged. My heart is incredibly full knowing that the future of Whale Beach SLSC is in safe hands.



IRB PROFILES

To become an IRB driver or crew member is one of the most exciting and thrilling opportunities surf lifesaving has to offer. We heard firsthand from some inspiring Whaley lifesavers about the perks of IRB training, and how they have applied their skills on the beach.

IRB Driver:

Meet Ethan Ravenhall. As one of our upcoming leaders, he is constantly inspiring others as a great role model and young surf lifesaver.

When and why did you become an IRB driver?

I became an IRB driver in the cold winter last year. The idea of driving an inflatable boat around Whale Beach seemed like an awesome opportunity to experience. Not only do you increase your knowledge about boating, you learn to skillfully drive to save patients. That was a challenge I wanted to take on.

What do you like about being an IRB driver?

I like the added responsibility that comes with being a driver, and the excitement and nervousness I feel when going over waves and the rush of speeding across the water. It really is a unique experience.

What would you say to other people thinking of becoming an IRB driver?

I would say just give it a go, anyone can do it and do it well. The people you meet and the skills you gain are invaluable and it's easily one of the most fun parts about surf lifesaving.

IRB Crew:

Meet Nina Mayne and Maddie Zagorski. As phenomenal lifesavers on the beach, these two are always helping others to be the best they can be.

When and why did you become an IRB crew member?

Nina: Six months after I got my Bronze, I started the IRB crew course. I grew up around boats, so I felt drawn to the duck (despite getting seasick), and it was one of the first awards that I wanted to get.

What do you like about doing an IRB crew course?

Maddie: My favourite thing about the IRB crew course is the fun I have when going out in the boat and going over waves. I also like the skills and rescue tips I've learnt throughout the course as it makes me more confident as an overall surf lifesaver at Whale Beach, which is my general goal whenever taking a new course.

The people you meet and the skills you gain are invaluable

What is your best memory as an IRB crew member?

Nina: The first time I went in the duck, my heart had never raced so fast with fear and excitement. Truth be told, I still get that feeling each time I get in the boat. Being the crew member on my patrol, means I am the first to the action.

What would you say to other people thinking of becoming an IRB crew member?

Maddie: I believe the IRB course was one of the best courses I've done through surf lifesaving. It has brought a whole new experience to surf rescues, as well as being heaps of fun to take out in the water for practice.

This season was a huge success with Pymble girls gaining over 30 awards

Yeah. The Girls. Pymble Ladies' College students have been changing the game. This season was a huge success with Pymble girls gaining over 30 awards, holding positions as Patrol Vice Captains, mentors, and training delegates, and together patrolling over 400 hours. Nine Pymble girls became surf lifesavers, with a total of 28 current students patrolling the golden sand of Whale Beach, the largest Pymble contingent in over five seasons. For the first time in our 14 year partnership we opened our doors to Year 7 girls to achieve their Surf Rescue Certificate. It was a great success with some phenomenal surf lifesavers coming through and will be repeated for years to come.

After such an epic season, I'd like to take this opportunity to reflect on how far we've come, and the role our graduating leaders have played. Sophie Rothery, Immy Baker, and Eloise Riley have led the way for Pymble's revival. Sophie and Eloise were the only two Pymble girls to gain their Bronze Medallion in 2015 and have since gone on to gain nearly every higher award available, mentor younger members, and hugely increase participation in Pymble's Surf Life Saving program. Patrol Vice Captain Sophie kicked off our season when she was named a Surf Life Saving NSW finalist for Young Volunteer of the Year, and took out Surf Life Saving NSW awards for Volunteer of the Year (Northern Beaches Region) and Young

Volunteer of the Year. Eloise 'Superfish' Riley capped off our season by earning her Gold Medallion, only the third, and youngest, woman in Whale Beach SLSC's history to earn it.

When I asked our graduating members to reflect on their experience in Pymble's Surf Life Saving program, Immy Baker summed it up beautifully, 'As a new Pymble girl, I was emailed the opportunity to become a member of Whale Beach SLSC. I decided to step out of my comfort zone and visit the Club not knowing anyone and I am so lucky because it is my second home and family now.' We are incredibly grateful for the contributions you have all made to Whale Beach SLSC and the growth of Pymble's Surf Life Saving program. We wish the best to the class of 2018 and we can't wait to see you back on the beach next season.

Thank you to Katie Edwards who has been the head of Pymble Surf Life Saving for the past three seasons, and welcome to Michael Massih who will be taking on the role moving forward. We're all excited to see the Pymble program grow to become bigger and better than ever, with new ideas, opportunities for competition, and recognition of the girls' phenomenal voluntary contributions. KNOX GRAMMAR SCHOOL SURF LIFE SAVING PROGRAM

Knox Grammar School enjoyed another fantastic year at Whale Beach throughout the 2018-19 season. This season, the school sport saw an increase in numbers from around 60 students in 2017-18 to over 100 students learning the vital skills of surf lifesaving. The Knox season was split into two main sections. The first, in Term 4 is dedicated to gaining awards and upskilling members in surf rescue techniques. The second, in Term 1 is dedicated to competition training and involves carnivals against Barker, St Ignatius, St Joseph's and Shore.

Term 4 saw 50 students from Years 10 to 12 gain their Bronze Medallion, along with 20 students from Years 8 and 9 gaining their Surf Rescue Certificate. With an influx of new students, the more experienced senior students were withheld from upskilling their own lifesaving skills due to water safety requirements, however a number of boys were still able to gain their IRB Crew, as well as Senior First Aid, and ARTC, all vital elements when completing a Gold Medallion

assessment. This season our aim was to push as many boys as possible towards sitting the Gold Medallion assessment, however due to a massive demand from other beaches to upskill their own members, Knox was not able to produce any Golden Whales. This year also included the recruitment of qualified instructors into the program to ensure that all students received a more professional training program, as well as assistance in the more theory-based aspects of the sport.

Term 1 saw the annual Knox / Barker carnival held at Whale Beach. The event was a great success with possibly the most organised and professional looking carnival conducted by any school in the past. A massive thanks goes to all parents involved. The carnival also resulted in a Knox victory at the event, for the first time in over five years. The term also saw the inclusion of past Knox students and Whale Beach members assisting boys in board training which noticeably improved the paddling style of many students and will definitely be utilised again next season.

With this season behind us, and a lot of competition-based plans in the pipeline, next year will see more opportunities for boys to improve their physical strength and fitness, as well as gain more awards, in order to make the 2019-20 season at Whale Beach even more successful.

Overall, Knox has taken many strong steps to enhance the experience of our boys and ensure that Whale Beach continues to be in safe hands. I would like to thank Andrew Pearce, Alex Burchett, Lara Boyle and the rest of the education and executive team for their continued support of the Knox program and for their constant communication and feedback to keep this sport and our partnership as successful as possible. I would also like to thank all of my staff who worked tirelessly throughout the season and want to give a special thanks to Nick Warby (Director of Aquatic Sports at Knox) for his relentless support and assistance with running such a large sport and making my job a lot easier to manage.

HISTORICAL RESCUES BY WHALE BEACH SLSC MEMBERS

Two Men Rescued From Disabled Launch

The first Bronze Medallions were gained by Club members on 9 January 1938. The first testing challenge for members happened on Australia Day 26 January 1938. In a very heavy swell, a disabled motor launch with two men on board was being swept towards the rocks at the south end of the beach. Club member Noel Greenfield dived from the rocks and swam to the launch with the idea to help start the motor. This proved unsuccessful and with the two men being non-swimmers, Noel swam back to the rocks, donned a belt and line and swam back again to the launch. He brought one of the men ashore, with both of them suffering severe buffeting and lacerations over the wave swept rocks. James Barnes with others from Palm Beach SLSC arrived to assist in this life threatening situation. James donned a belt and line, swam out from the rocks and courageously rescued the other man. Soon after, the launch was swept against the rocks and wrecked. Noel Greenfield and James Barnes received the Meritorious Award in Bronze by the Meritorious Awards Committee of the Surf Life Saving Association of Australia.

Three Rescued in The Presence of Three Sharks

March 1946. The Whale Beach surfboat crew saw three large sharks up to twelve feet long as they were standing by the buoys ready for the start of a surf swim race, when 150 yards from the beach, the surfboat was hit by a large wave and swamped, the crew was hurled into the water. In very testing surf conditions and although also aware of the presence of sharks, four Club members donned belts and swam out to assist those in the water. The members were George McRobert, Bill McKeon, Neil McCool and Ken Hall. The Club belt champion swam out without a belt and was first to reach those in trouble. He supported the one who was in a distressed condition until the beltman arrived and all were pulled safely back to the beach.

Man Drowned, Four Saved at Whale Beach

In February 1955, a 47 year old man drowned while surfing with his two sons. Five lifesavers used surf lines to rescue the two sons and two

other men who were in extreme difficulties in the same rip area. One of the Whale Beach lifesavers was 14 year old Colin Timms. The others were John Kirby aged 17, Bill Marlin 19, Les Singleton 19 and Les Chamberlain 19. There were two rips running in opposite directions and they met in the middle of the beach and ran out to sea with a vicious undertow. Bill Kirby related the rescue: 'I went out with the line and could see five people caught in the rip. When I reached one he shouted 'get hold of my father'. I let go of him and swam to his father who was in great difficulty. I caught hold of the father but then a huge wave dumped on us and he was torn from my grasp. The other lifesavers and I got to and brought in the two sons and the two men. We then swam back to search for the father and Les Singleton found him floating face down. We got a line around him and with great difficulty got him to the beach.' Artificial respiration was applied for 40 minutes without success. From his weekender Dr David Low saw the rescue taking place and rushed to the beach. He gave the unfortunate man an injection but he did not revive. This fatality was the first on Whale Beach during beach patrol hours.

Exhausted Diver Saved

1985. The drama began when a diver got into trouble in heavy seas near the rocks. His cries for help were heard by nearby residents who alerted the lifesavers. While several ran to the headland rocks, Paul Young and Jon Uren quickly got the IRB in the water. Jon Uren said, 'When we arrived, the man was clinging to a rock. He had ditched his tank and weights. He must have been exhausted because as soon as I hit the water with a torpedo buoy, he let go. The swell was bad with wind chop. I managed to pull him from the surge and back to the boat.' The man had collapsed and was given oxygen by the lifesavers until an ambulance arrived.

Youth Drowned in a Rescue Attempt

On Tuesday 10 December 1963, 17 year old David O'Keefe disappeared in heavy surf when he endeavoured to assist a 28 year old man in difficulty. Peter Webster, a Whale Beach lifesaver, was swimming further down the beach when the situation caught his attention. He ran to the Club, pressed the alarm siren and with a surf reel line, he swam about 100 yards to the desperately struggling youth. They were dumped by a wave and Peter became entangled in the line and had to let go of the youth and then get out of the belt and line. He struggled ashore in an exhausted state where he was given oxygen to revive. Meanwhile, 15 year old lifesaver, Martin Armstrong swam out to the older man together with another boy. The rip was too strong to help the man through so Martin swam back to the beach and paddled back out on a surfboard. With the help of 16 year old Phil Cullis, another Whale Beach member, the man was brought safely to the beach. Martin, Phil and other Club members then took the surfboat out and searched for David O'Keefe, joined by a Water Police launch. After several hours no trace was found of the brave but unfortunate, David O'Keefe.

Couple Saved By Veterans

On 15 January 1996 two senior Whale Beach SLSC members were walking along North Palm Beach when they became aware that two people were caught in a very strong rip and were unable to get back to shore. The club members were Hal Baily and Keith Burney and both men were in their late seventies with Keith having a heart condition. They removed some of their clothing and swam out to the couple who were some 150 metres off shore. Keith Burney towed the woman to a sandbar where he encouraged her to stand so he could return and assist with the man. The woman became hysterical so Keith took her right in safely to the beach before then helping Hal bring the man the last few metres to safety. Hal Baily had rolled the distressed man onto his back, placed his left arm over his shoulders, sidestroked across the rip to even water and a sandbar where they were able to stand. A surfboard rider came to them and they lifted the exhausted man onto the board and swam him to shore. For their brave action in this rescue, Hal Baily and Keith Burney received official government 'Commendations for Brave Conduct'.

VALE KEITH JONES

CHAMPION SURFBOAT SWEEP REMEMBERED BY JOHN BAIRD, BRIAN GRABER, ROB BERRY



In October 1937 the Club was formed with some 22 members. In December 1938, a secondhand surfboat was donated by Dee Why SLSC and was named 'Riptide'. This was the start of many seasons of strong surfboat competition by Whale Beach crews at carnivals. The years from 1950 to the 1980s saw a big growth in membership and in 1953 the opening of the two level clubhouse on land owned by the Club and funded by members.

In the season of 1953 the Whale Beach Junior Crew won the NSW State Championships at Caves Beach and then went on to take second in the Australian Championships held at Newport. The member who swept the boat to these victories was Keith Jones with the crew of Brian Graber, John Baird, Spike Gilligan and Arthur 'Choco' Halligan. Keith was also sweep for a number of senior crews with a good string of successes.

Keith gained his Bronze Medallion at age 17 years, he then trained and became Chief Instructor guiding many in achieving the Bronze. He gave of much time to help dig the foundations for the clubhouse and setup a machine to make bricks needed for the building. At the end of the 1950s Keith moved to Yamba to manage a hotel and to get married. The wedding was attended by a strong group of Whaley members in support of the very popular Keith Jones.

In March 2019 Keith Stanley Jones, aged 89 years, passed away. We remember and pay homage to Keith for his significant contribution to our Club. Thank you.

VALE PETER TOSI



Sadly, Life Member Peter Tosi passed away on the afternoon of 26 February 2019 at Greenwich Hospital aged 79 years.

Peter Tosi obtained his Bronze Medallion in 1960 at Coalcliff SLSC on the NSW South Coast. After becoming a Whale Beach resident, Peter joined Whale Beach SLSC at the commencement of the 1997-98 season and became a popular member of the 'Grey Whales' patrol for 16 years.

Peter was elected as Honorary Treasurer in the 2002-03 season and served on the Executive for the next twelve years. Peter secured Macquarie Group as the major sponsor of The Big Swim, a partnership which has endured for 20 years. It was during Peter's tenure as Treasurer that the Club raised the funds and carried out extensive building renovations resulting in the first class facility we all enjoy today and will do so for many years to come. At the Annual General Meeting in 2014, Peter was elected as a Life Member for his significant service to Whale Beach SLSC.

Peter was passionate about allowing the younger generations to take on responsibilities and helping them learn how to run the Club, ensuring that our future is in safe hands.

Peter was a keen and competent swimmer, a regular in Sunday Competition as well as numerous ocean swims including The Big Swim. Peter was also a very fond member of the '7am'ers' who meet every day for a body surf and then adjourn to the clubhouse for 'parliament' and coffee to solve the problems of the world.

His presence and vibrant personality will be very much missed at our Club. The Club extends our condolences to Peter's wife Gwyn and family. Gwyn has been a strong supporter of our social and fundraising activities for many years.
