ACTING PRESIDENT'S REPORT

"Adapt yourself to the life you have been given"

Part of the role of lifesavers is to take care of each other. We have a responsibility to respect each other. We have a duty of care toward each and every member of our tribe. And most of all, we owe the most to those that do the most.

Last year, when I closed off what I thought was my last year as President, I left you all with my genuine and heartfelt wish for the season. And forever.

"To live lighter. To have more fun, To celebrate others. To know we are truly blessed.

And to know that "It's Better to be Wetter ... at Whale."

This year, I report that it was not a light, fun-filled year full of celebrating how blessed we all are. It was a year that my dear mum would call "a challenge".. I really don't want to dwell on the events that ended up with our Secretary resigning early in the season, and our elected

President being reprimanded However I think it is important to acknowledge the consequences. And the impacts. On people. Including me. With at least a vague semblance of hope that this will be a learning for all. The learning for me is around adaptability. And resilience. These have been essential. For survival.

The passion that should and could have been directed in a supportive direction with compassion and understanding turned into a divisive problem. We avoided redemption and moving on as a team and instead detracted time and valuable resource from our core purpose. Of keeping people safe. Our own people. The most important people of all. We lacked unity. We forgot, for a moment, our purpose.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Jack Lamrock Secretary

This year began with significant upheaval for the Club, marked by a sudden and challenging leadership transition. The departure of both the President and Secretary early in the season created a period of instability and uncertainty. What had been a promising trajectory was abruptly disrupted, diverting focus and energy away from the core mission of the Club. Instead, much of the attention was consumed by internal issues, leading to fragmentation within the membership and raising doubts about the Management Committee's ability to effectively govern.

It was within this context that I stepped into the role of Secretary. From the outset, I was committed to re-establishing trust, structure, and transparency.

A key part of this was ensuring that all administrative processes were robust, accessible, and consistent. By prioritising proper documentation clear meeting minutes, wellprepared proposals, and improved communication-I aimed to bring clarity and accountability back to the Management Committee's operations.

In addition to this, all Club Officer positions holding portfolios have been strongly encouraged to establish or activate committees that are either constitutionally mandated or practically needed. These committees are essential for supporting decision-making and embedding community voice into our processes. Involving members outside of the Management Committee is key to drawing on a wider range of perspectives and providing meaningful entry points for participation in our Club's governance.

I'd like to extend my gratitude to everyone involved in the Life Saving Committee-may your meeting minutes be the legacy we strive to achieve across all other committees that are still finding their feet.

While the season was not without its challenges, I'm proud of the progress we made in rebuilding a sense of order and integrity. The work is ongoing, but the foundation is now stronger. I'd like to thank the other members of all the committees for their willingness to adapt and engage in this process, and the broader membership for their patience during a difficult period.

Looking ahead, I hope we continue to build on these improvements, fostering a culture where good governance that supports the great work that happens Between the Flags.

TREASURER'S **REPORT Andrew Pearce**

Treasurer

I am pleased to present the financial report for the year ended 30 April 2025. This season called on us to adapt with care, act with purpose, and work with and for one another — all essential qualities in a volunteer organisation where our people are both our greatest asset and our most enduring strength. Our commitment to lifesaving operations and maintaining essential equipment and facilities was underpinned by a disciplined approach to financial stewardship. While the final figures reflect a modest trading loss, our core lifesaving activities are well-supported, and we remain in a sound financial position. We continue to operate with robust financial oversight, and I am pleased to report that all funds were managed in accordance with the Club's governance policies and the Charitable Fundraising Act requirements.

For FY25, the Club recorded total income of \$672,448, down from \$849,693 in the prior year. This decline was primarily due to a reduction in donations (-\$71,430) and lower revenue from food and beverage operations (-\$92,872). Total expenses were \$701,623 (down from \$826,484), resulting in a net loss of \$29,175. Despite this, we maintain a positive equity position of \$129,157 and continue to operate as a going concern.

Our largest income stream remained our food and beverage operation, with The Deck kiosk providing \$395,579 in revenue as well as serving as a vital community hub. The decline in food and beverage income was driven primarily by adverse trading conditions. Thanks to the stellar efforts of Race Director Simon Morgan, The Big Swim again proved to be a cornerstone fundraiser, contributing \$111,758. Membership subscriptions were \$71,993, down slightly in line with a decline in member numbers. The increase in sponsorship income was due to timing of payments. We gratefully acknowledge the ongoing support of the Macquarie Group, now in their 26th year as principal sponsor of The Big Swim, as well as the generous support of McGrath Pittwater for The Little Big Swim. The large variance in donations is attributed to several one-off contributions received last year, primarily toward the acquisition of the Bill Phillips surf boat.

The drop in surf club function income reflects the absence of the Women of Whale fundraising event this year. We are also fortunate to benefit from grants made possible by Northern Beaches Council, Surf Life Saving NSW, and Surf Life Saving Australia.

Total expenses for the year were \$701,623. Significant expense categories included food and beverage operations (\$352,969), repairs and maintenance (\$85,245), depreciation (\$70,425), and surf club functions (\$26,718). The increase in depreciation reflects recent investments in IRBs, rescue boards and racks, the new surf boat, gym equipment, and kiosk furniture. We also developed and launched new swimwear this year. which required an initial investment in inventory. Importantly, we continued supporting our lifesavers through subsidised membership fees, training course fees, and patrol lunches.

The Club closed the financial year with \$6,584 in cash on hand, a decrease from \$10,109 the year prior.

This financial performance is made possible by the dedication of our volunteers, the loyalty of our members, and the generosity of our donors and sponsors. Special thanks go to Macquarie Group for their enduring support, as well as to McGrath Pittwater and all who contributed to our fundraising efforts throughout the season. I would like to express

my personal thanks to Nat O'Carroll, our hyper-efficient Club Administrator, for her exceptional support; to Richard Simec and Tess Harris for their outstanding work operating The Deck kiosk; and to my fellow Committee members for their ongoing leadership. Your engagement is essential to the ongoing success and sustainability of Whale Beach SLSC. I'm also deeply grateful for the support and guidance provided by past Treasurers Andrew Darley and Jon Pratten, and extend my thanks to Kevin Veale, our long-serving Auditor, for his expertise and diligence.

Despite the current year's operating deficit the Club remains wellplaced for the year ahead. We will continue to focus on our core revenue streams, controlling costs, and investing in initiatives that support our lifesaving operations and community engagement.

As we look to FY26, continued community support - through donations, sponsorships, and volunteering - will be essential to help us meet rising operating costs and maintain high standards of service, safety, and inclusion.

In a year where we adjusted to new conditions and leaned on each other more than ever, we've lived out this year's guiding sentiment: to adapt ourselves to the life we've been given, and to truly love the people with whom destiny has surrounded us.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The 2024/25 season was one of growth, strength, and connection - a time where our Club adapted to every challenge and celebrated the people who make Whale Beach what it is. The theme for the season served as a steady reminder that surf lifesaving is not just about skill and service, but about shared purpose and the community we build around it.

Throughout the season. Whale Beach patrolling members contributed over 1,412 hours to beach safety. Across countless weekends and public holidays, our patrol teams carried out 5 rescues, 89 first aid responses, and 242 proactive preventative actions. These efforts, visible and invisible, helped keep the beach safe for everyone who stepped onto the sand.

This season saw numerous upskilling opportunities for our members, with many taking advantage of the chance to further develop their lifesaving skills. Members embraced the challenge of expanding their qualifications, stepping recognition and appreciation. into new roles, and enhancing their expertise. Leadership and initiative were evident across every patrol, as more members confidently took on responsibilities, contributing to the Club's deepening strengths.

The Lifesaving Committee was instrumental in keeping operations running smoothly. Their quiet but critical work - from managing rosters and compliance, to ensuring equipment was operational and training sessions were supported - laid the groundwork for a safe and efficient season. Their commitment to excellence allowed patrols to focus on what mattered most: the people on the beach.

The Big Swim once again showcased the strength of the Whale Beach lifesaving community. From first light to pack-down, members worked together across land, sea, and sky to ensure a smooth, safe event. Whether in the IRBs, on rescue boards, supporting with the RWC, or looking down from the helicopter, the water safety provided was incredible.

The commitment shown by all involved was outstanding, and community feedback reflected that professionalism and care.

More than just numbers and events, this season was defined by the culture on the beach. Patrols were marked by laughter, teamwork, mutual support, and genuine care. New members were welcomed, experienced members mentored generously, and a shared sense of pride could be felt every weekend under the patrol tent.

In an exciting step forward, the Club launched Member of the Month to acknowledge those consistently going above and beyond. Additionally, formal award nominations were opened up to include peer nominations - a meaningful change that empowered members to celebrate one another's efforts and fostered a deeper culture of

Looking to the future, the focus remains on building connection between patrol members, across experience levels, and within the broader Club community. Strengthening patrol diversity, expanding training opportunities, and ensuring each member feels supported and valued will be at the heart of the lifesaving strategy going forward.

The Education Team launched the season with renewed determination, drawing on our past experiences and the energy of new recruits. With a new CTO and the return of highly qualified trainer Lara Boyle, alongside Head Trainers Eloise Love, Cameron Cormio, and Madeline Zagorski, we were well prepared for success. Our primary objective was to continue the Club's legacy of keeping the beach safe by recruiting and training new members and increasing the number of qualified trainers.

We are proud to announce that Olivia Rees-Ewen and Angus Wines achieved their Training Officer Award this season. Natasha Hodgkinson and Stephanie Darley joined as probationary trainers, alongside Samantha Darley and Hamish Jones; all on track to complete their trainer's award.

The season started positively, with Lara. Eloise. Madeline. Adam Treharne and Olivia attending the TAFS Proficiency Day at Freshwater. They enhanced their

emergency response training and returned ready to uphold high standards at Whale Beach.

From September to December, we conducted annual skills maintenance for all awards including Bronze, SRC, ART, and IRB Driver and Crew proficiencies, despite the challenging October weather. With flexibility and teamwork, we ran five sessions. Unfortunately, we had reduced numbers returning to complete their proficiency. We are grateful to all those who jumped in to help us: David Stenning, Adam Treharne, and Warren Howard from North Palm Beach Surf Club

Our first long-format Bronze Medallion course attracted a diverse group of new recruits, all of whom successfully completed the award and began patrolling immediately. In February, we ran a shorter intensive Bronze course that brought in another group of eager participants. For those unable to attend these longer courses, we offered the Surf Life Saving Academy's four-day Intensive

Training courses, providing an effective and accessible option.

Our partnership with Knox Grammar remains strong, continuing to thrive under the leadership of Whale Beach trainers and lifesavers. Cameron Cormio was supported by Angus Wines, Toby Milroy, William Gibson, Brooklyn Clarke-Bruce, Travis Cox and Madeline Zagorski in delivering training and building this connection.

Across all these courses, we proudly welcomed 39 new Bronze Medallion holders. In addition, we awarded 44 First Aid certificates, 14 Advanced Resuscitation Technique (ART) awards, and 5 new Silver Medallion Patrol Captain awards, 2 Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue and 1 Gold Medallion-highlighting our members' ongoing commitment to skill development.

Although we missed our IRB trainer, Lindsay Kershaw, Cameron Cormio worked tirelessly to build confidence in members keen to take on the mighty IRB. We are grateful to Palm Beach Surf Life Saving Club for including our recruits in their training. Supported by Stephanie Darley, Zander Barkworth and Jayden Yiu as helpers, we successfully doubled the number of new IRB Crew and Drivers from last season, welcoming 13 and 10 respectively. Furthermore, 4 members attended the Australian Lifesaving Boat Emergency Rescue Training (ALBERT) course in April-a fantastic achievement.

As the season closes, we are poised for an even stronger year ahead. Recruitment and training remain at the heart of ensuring a safe, inclusive, and enjoyable Club environment. The Education Team is proud to be part of a club that values every member's contribution, and we look forward to the continued successes to come.



GEAR AND EQUIPMENT REPORT

Hamish Jones Gear Officer

This season has seen significant progress in the development and enhancement of our Club's gear and equipment capability. As Gear Officer, I am pleased to report on a year marked by major upgrades, a renewed focus on preventative maintenance, and stronger operational readiness.

A major highlight of the year was the delivery of our new Thundercat Gen III Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB). This state-of-the-art IRB is a key addition to our rescue fleet and enhances our on-water capability, particularly in dynamic surf conditions. It represents our commitment to maintaining modern, reliable rescue assets that support both patrol operations and training activities.

Thanks to the SLSA Beach Safety Equipment Fund, we were also able to acquire a roadregistrable IRB trailer. This has been a transformative addition, allowing our IRB assets to be

easily transported outside of Whale Beach for inter-club events, emergency callouts, and regional training exercises. The trailer significantly boosts our responsiveness and flexibility during major incidents.

In our ongoing effort to ensure equipment reliability, we have engaged a new mechanic for our IRB motors. This has allowed us to implement a proactive, preventative maintenance regime, focused on reducing equipment downtime, extending the life of our assets, and ensuring that all rescue craft are in a state of operational readiness throughout the season.



"Paul grew up on Ocean Beach Road, Ocean Beach (now Umina), joining Ocean Beach SLSC as a Junior. A powerful swimmer, he was credited with many Central Coast rescues and was Central Coast Branch Junior Surf and Junior Belt Champion as well as Club Champion. Paul joined the Whale Beach Surf Life Saving Club at the beginning of the 1960-1961 surfing season.

He and partner Jill and Jill's son Stephen lived in Morella Road, immediately behind the surf club building, where he had a perfect view of the beach allowing for earliest sighting of swimmers in distress. As he relates, "Jill and I were sitting on the veranda with our first Gin and Tonic when the siren sounded. I ran down and was told a person was taken out by the South end rip and Hal Bailey is out there holding him up. By the time I found them it

was pitch black, best approach was to swim north and back to the beach." Just one of Paul's many.

Our Club acquired a Hamilton Jet Offshore Rescue boat through a donation from our then licensed Club, the Moby Dick Club Inc. Paul immediately signed up, became the Jet Boat Captain, and commenced crew training. The offshore rescue boat completed many rescues with Paul at the helm.

Paul, in 1974, along with 47 other Club members swam the first Palm Beach to Whale Beach Ocean swim. And was first in. A proud honour

BBQ king, cooking and providing

Club members every Saturday and Sunday delicious sausages, rissoles, and steaks all with salad. Also, along with Colin Timms, Rob Berry, Peter Burgess, and Rich Stewart, was a member of the Gear Team for 23 years, meeting every Thursday to clean, sterilise and prepare the gear for the coming weekend. Paul's main contribution after assisting Colin with sterilizing the caps and whistles, was to sit on a chair while the rest of the team were busily working around him providing us with comic relief.

He was elected to the prestigious Life Membership for his many years of devoted service. Paul said that he was elected to Life Membership for cooking rissoles, but those of us who knew him also knew better. and that it was because of his long term patrol service, his prowess in the sea, the many lives he saved as an exceptionally strong swimmer, and for his outstanding rescue skills. Paul Hughes was one of this Club's most outstanding surf lifesavers.

Paul our friend, we will miss you, your wry humour, the smiles, and friendship and good times we shared. But forget you mate? No, not ever.
